Teaching Grace & Courtesy at Home

Montessori education is just as important in the home as it is in a school environment. To support your child between their home and school life, parents should try to implement the tactics and behaviors used by teachers in school, especially in regard to an important Montessori principle: Grace and Courtesy.

What is Grace and Courtesy? Simply put, the idea of Montessori Grace and Courtesy is all about helping children to understand polite social norms. Basically, it is the language of respect and kindness, as well as the social etiquette we need in everyday society.

To implement the idea at home, you should first observe your child and learn from them what they already know and what they need to improve on. Your focus should be on a positive, constructive

representation that allows the children to learn the lessons without having to force them. Grace and Courtesy starts with intentional modeling in your interactions with your child. Our behavior as adults should always reflect the idea to children what we hope to see mirrored back.



Some ways to implement Grace and Courtesy at home and in public are:

- Model how to greet and welcome visitors
- Learn how to politely get the attention of someone and participate in a group discussion without interrupting
- Discuss how to resolve a social conflict using words and actions intentionally
- Display kindness by holding the door for someone, allowing cars to merge in front of you while driving, making polite conversation while standing in line
- How to use polite words such as please, thank you, excuse me, etc, while home and out in public
- Contribute to the health and wellness of the home by helping with chores
- Have a polite conversation about a sensitive topic while expressing opinions confidently

Keeping kids safe in the New Mexico sun




Skin cancer is the most common type of cancer in New Mexico and in the U.S. Ultraviolet (UV) radiation exposure from the sun during childhood and adolescence is a key risk factor for developing this disease.

Preventing skin cancer starts early in life!

More than 50% of a person's lifetime UV exposure occurs by the age of 18. Adopting sun safety behaviors during childhood and adolescence is currently the best method for preventing skin cancer. Instilling good sun safety habits in young children can prevent skin cancer later in life!

Here are some things you can do to protect your kids:

- * Keep them out of the sun between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. when the sun's rays are the strongest. It's important to be protected even on cloudy days. Clouds don't filter out all UV rays and they may give a false sense of protection. Some of the most serious sunburns happen when the sky is overcast. If your kids must be outside, remind them to seek shade under trees, beach umbrellas and tents.
- * Provide them with a sunscreen with a minimum sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 15. Choose a sunscreen that provides protection against both UVA and UVB rays. Apply sunscreen 30 minutes before going outdoors and reapply every 2 hours and more often after swimming or exercise.
- * Make sure your kids wear sunglasses! It's the best way to protect the delicate skin around your children's eyes.
- * Provide them with protective clothing such as long sleeves and pants. And, since 80% of skin cancers occur on the

Remember to be sun safe everyday!

Know your risks for skin cancer

Anyone can get skin cancer, but your risk (and your child's) risk is higher if you have experienced any of the following:

- One or more severe, blistering sunburns
- A large number of moles on your skin
- A family or personal history of skin cancer
- Fair skin and light colored hair and eyes

It's never too early to teach your children about sun protection! Set a good example for your children by making sun safety part of your family's daily routine - just like buckling up in the car or brushing teeth!

Lower Elementary Level Updates

Through hands-on activities and experiments, our students have been discovering the characteristics of different insects, learning about the anatomy of flowers, and exploring the formation of rocks.

In addition to our science studies, our 4-6 program recently completed the Choose Love curriculum. This program aligned perfectly with our Montessori Peace curriculum and focused on four key elements: Courage, Gratefulness, Forgiveness, and Compassion. Our students had a blast creating peace flowers and participating in the peace dove art project, which allowed them to express and understand their emotions in a healthy and constructive way. Our goal is to equip our students with the tools they need to communicate in healthy and peaceful ways.

As we wrap up the school year, we are looking forward to celebrating our students' achievements and accomplishments. We will be holding an end-of-year celebration and graduation ceremony to honor our kindergarten graduates, please refer to the memo from your child's teacher. At the 1st & 2nd Grade level, as we reflect on the end of this school year, it's exciting to see how much our 1st and 2nd grade students have grown and learned. Throughout the year, they have been exposed to a range of topics, and these final weeks have been no exception. The students have delved into the 4th and 5th great lessons, where they explored the origins of writing and numbers. They have discovered the different writing, alphabet and number systems that have been used throughout history and in different parts of the world. As we wrap up the school year, we are grateful for the many learning opportunities that our 1st and 2nd grade students have experienced. We are proud of their growth, creativity and resilience, and we look forward to seeing what they will accomplish in the future. Lower Elementary Level Updates (cont.)

In the 3rd Grade level, 3rd grade has had a fantastic year! Our students have grown so much and we have developed a strong community.

Our trip to Camp Oro Quay in the fall was a big highlight. We built community within our level and the students learned what is expected when going out on trips with our school. It was an excellent foundational experience for all of our students and will inform their experiences going forward. We are excited to go on our end of the year trip with the 4th graders on May 9th and 10th!

Our weekly cultural lessons on Wednesday and theme days on Friday also strengthened our community. Wednesday cultural lessons were a great time to share our knowledge and learn best practices for being in large group lessons. Some memorable theme days were; guinea pig and snake day (we got to meet the class pets from 9-11), board game day, art day, donut day, and stuffy day!

Finally, the Choose Love curriculum has been the driving force of our community all year. We explored all four parts of the Choose Love Formula as well as a bonus unit on Growth Mindset. As we finish off the year, we hope our students will take what they learned this year from Choose Love to guide them as they move into 9-11.

We are really proud of this group of 3rd graders and know they will go on to do great things! Thank you to all of the families for all of your support throughout the year!



Upper Elementary Level Update (cont.)

In the **9-11 level** we have been busy since we came back from Spring Break. The month of April saw all of our students successfully complete their NM-MSSA Math and Language Arts state tests and our 5th years completed their first NM-ASR, which is a state test in Science. We are extremely proud of all the students for completing these tests!

In addition to testing and preparing our students for testing, we have been working on some really fun cultural projects. In Geography, students have been working on planning a five state road trip across the United States. We spent the first part of the semester learning about the five different regions in the US and this project was a culmination of that learning. Students were asked to research and determine which five states they wanted to visit, plan their driving route, calculate mileage, the cost of gas, plan their sightseeing and food budget and select specific places they wanted to visit and justify their choices. In Science, students have had a series of fun activities including making environmental posters for Earth Day that have been proudly displayed around our school to encourage making better choices for the environment. In writing, students have been working on how to create a sound argument to support their personal opinions on various topics like wanting to live in a Tiny House (or not), why their favorite fast food restaurant is the best, and a comparative essay weighing two sides of an argument and explaining their personal choices.

On the really fun side of things we had day field trips to Camp Oro-Quay where the fourth years students were able to spend the day with the incoming fourth year students (currently the third years) for a day filled with hiking, crafting, water relays and getting to know their new peers. Fifth years also went with the sixth graders who helped acquaint them with what to expect in middle school. Finally, we have some fun celebrations for our outgoing fifth years who will be graduating from elementary school this year. On May 22, we will be going to Meow Wolf with them and on May 24, we will hold a graduation ceremony for the fifth years and their families to celebrate this important milestone in their school career. It has been a wonderful year in 9-11! We look forward to a restful summer for all and are excited for the 2023-24 school year!



Middle School Level Update


At the Middle School level


Fine Arts Update
